THE MARSHAL OF SAID DISTRICT, ORDER-  
ING:

WHEREAS, Jacob Hausman has exhib-  
ited his bill, stating, alleging, and propoun-  
ding, that, on Wednesday morning, March  
the nineteenth, while pursuing his profes-  
sion, (that of a watchman on the Floor & Roof)  
about day-light in the morning discovered a  
vessel on shore on the Roof: That on board-  
ing her he found her to be the English ship  
BRITANIA, from Jamaica and bound to  
London, and commanded by Christopher  
Lamb, with a cargo of

Sugar, Rum, Coffee, Pinen-  
to, Pistie and Hiles;

That on enquiry of the captain if he wish-  
ed assistance, was immediately employed;  
and that he consorted with the sloop Cap-  
ital, commanded by John Walker, the schr.  
General Gaddes, commanded by John Page,  
and the schooner Florida, commanded by  
Thomas Rooker, with great difficulty and  
hazard saved the said ship and cargo from  
being totally lost. Whereupon, he prays  
that the ship and cargo be condemned, and  
an adequate proportion thereof be adjudg-

To Mariners.

FIVE Large Spanish BUOYS have been  
moored in the Channel leading from  
the Gulf Stream, through the Hubert of  
KEY WEST, into the Bay of Mexico. Ves-  
sels drawing 9-12 feet water, and bound to  
Mobile, Pensacola and New Orleans, can by  
observing the following directions, pass  
through this Channel with perfect safety,  
and thus avoid the tedious and dangerous  
navigation of the Gulf:—

It is recommended to Masters of Vessels  
to steer from Buoy to Buoy, keeping close  
to them on either hand.—They are moored  
in the deepest water and can be distinctly  
seen from each other. The bearings of the  
Buoys are as follows:

The 1st Buoy at the entrance of the Chan-  
nel and nearly in the Harbour of Key  
West, bears from the Light-House, on  
Key West by Compass N. W. by West,  
distant 1 mile.

2d Buoy bears from the 1st Buoy N. W. by  
North.

3d Buoy bears from the 2d Buoy, N. W. 1-2  
south.

4th Buoy bears from the 3d Buoy, N. W. 1-2  
North.

5th Buoy on the Bar, bears from the Light-  
House, on Key West, North West by  
West.

Vessels requiring PILOTS can obtain  
them at Key West, as there is a board of  
branch Pilots established.

The shoalest water at low water is 10  
feet, and at high water 12-12 feet on the  
Bar.
